It's been almost one year since AMG National relocated to Fairfield University and it has been a very busy one for me as well as the Executive Board. During this time some changes have taken place to streamline the ordering process for advisors and features were added to the website to provide them with information and answers to questions. With just a few clicks of your mouse you can now access many documents that previously needed to be purchased as hard copies, as well as documents, such as the order form and price list, which have always been available on the website. Please take a moment to download the handbook, information on NFLW, price lists, and the updated order form, etc. You will also find an archive of past newsletters. All of these documents should provide lots of useful information for your chapter and its activities.

The order form has recently been revised and updated in order to expedite the processing and mailing of orders. Please note the following:

1. Chapters send orders (using the order form) via emails to the National office.
2. Chapters will pay the Treasurer with a check and include a paper copy of the order with the check

Shipping/handling charges and the prices for some items have also changed. You will find an explanation of these changes on the following page. **The current order form must be used when placing future orders.**

Towards the end of the fall semester, I will be mailing out posters for National Foreign Language Week 2018. Each chapter will receive one poster at no charge. If you wish to order more posters, you may use the new order form to do so. The cost will be \$6.00 per poster, plus shipping/handling.

Scholarship information and application forms are already available on the website, so students can get a head start on the applications when they return to school. The due date is February 1, 2018.

It has been a pleasure working with advisors and council members this year and I look forward to continue working with you in 2017-2018. As always, do not hesitate to contact me via email if you have any questions. If I can't answer your question, I'll forward it to the appropriate council member.

New Simplified Pricing & Lower Shipping Costs

In an effort to streamline and simplify our pricing structure, the National Executive Council has authorized a few small changes to the cost of AMG pins and affiliate certificates. The changes are quite modest, especially when considering that the prices for these items have not increased for 15 years (since at least 2003—perhaps longer). Beginning in September 2017 all AMG pins and affiliate certificates (Associate, Faculty, and Honorary) will be \$5.00. Please note that the cost for full student member certificates will not increase—that price is still \$25 (the same price since at least 2003).

The National Executive Council has also authorized also a simplification of the Shipping & Handling charges for all orders. In fact, the Shipping & Handling charge will still be \$10 (as it is now), but it will no longer increase for larger orders. In sum, for all orders, no matter how large or small, the Shipping & Handling charge will be just \$10. The only exception to this policy will be when rush delivery is requested. In such cases the Shipping & Handling charge will be \$10 plus the actual cost of the expedited shipping.

Governors Proclamations

Although a number of our advisers and regional VPs solicited governors in their regions to provide proclamations for National Foreign Language week, we only received three gubernatorial proclamations. Once again, we did not receive a Presidential Proclamation.

We wish to extend our thanks and appreciation to the Regional Vice Presidents for their efforts in obtaining these proclamations: Dr. June Carter (VP South Carolina) and Dr. David Aliano (VP New York), Dr. Beatriz Gómez Acuña (Illinois).



WHEREAS, one of Illinois' greatest strength is its diversity of people, and as a home to a thriving multicultural population, it is important for today's students to have opportunities to become bilingual or multilingual; and,

WHEREAS, the observance of National Foreign Language Week highlights the benefits of foreign language programs and encourages all American youth to broaden their horizons and scope of worldly knowledge by learning a second language so they can better understand and communicate with people of other nationalities and nations; and,

WHEREAS, more than ever, the individuals who make up our workforce need stronger language skills in order to interact with the rest of the world in commerce, diplomacy, science and cultural exchanges, and since the State of Illinois has an ever expanding role in the global marketplace, the business community needs employees who are proficient in languages other than English; and,

WHEREAS, learning one or more languages, in addition to English, is a core part of a strong educational program that helps prepare students for living in a multicultural, multilingual world, and reinforces learning in other subject areas; and,

WHEREAS, the introduction of language study from an early age provides the best opportunities for students to achieve meaningful proficiency and success in learning another language; and,

WHEREAS, the foreign language classroom is the venue where language and culture are intertwined and students gain new levels of appreciation and awareness of the worldwide community, enabling them to communicate and build successful relationships with people from other cultures and countries; and,

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois is proud to join teachers of foreign languages and students who embark on this global adventure, and acknowledge those who promote school language programs so that today's youth can increase their future potential through the ability to speak, understand, read, and write in other languages;

THEREFORE, I, Bruce Rauner, Governor of the State of Illinois, do hereby proclaim March 5-11, 2017, as **NATIONAL FOREIGN LANGUAGE WEEK** in Illinois.

Proclamation

WHEREAS, the benefits of learning a world language are immeasurable, and New York State supports opportunities for students to become bilingual/multilingual and multicultural, with most school districts in the state currently offering academic programs of world language study; and

WHEREAS, research indicates that early language study has been shown to strengthen students' performance in their first language as well as in other content areas, beginning language study early and continuing studies through extended instructional sequences affords students additional cognitive and mental benefits, including mental flexibility and creativity; and

WHEREAS, for students, the early study of world languages and culture advances the goal of communication through listening, speaking, reading and writing, and addresses the five components of learning a language: Communication, Culture, Connections, Comparisons and Communities; and

WHEREAS, in 2017, National Foreign Language Week celebrates its 40th anniversary as a nationwide campaign to raise awareness of the value and importance of world language study, and continues to highlight programs that encourage American youth to broaden their horizons and scope of understanding and communication with people of other nations and cultures; and

WHEREAS, the study of a world language fosters appreciation of other cultures as well as one's own language and culture, improves performance in other content areas, and cultivates students' growth into adults with proficiency in world languages and cross-cultural awareness, so, in order to maintain a competitive edge in career and business opportunities, individuals who make up our workforce need strong language skills to interact with the rest of the world in matters of commerce, diplomacy, science, and cultural exchange; and

WHEREAS, as a center of the global economy, New York is home to major corporations, financial institutions, and world-class resources for education, science, technology, and culture, and proficiency in world languages and greater cross-cultural awareness can benefit students in college and their future careers; in 2017, New York became the second state in the nation to enact legislation establishing the New York State Seal of Bilingualism (NYSSB) which recognizes high school graduates who demonstrate confidence in attaining proficiency in one or more languages other than English; the NYSSB encourages the study of languages, identifies high school graduates with language and bilingual skills for employers, provides universities with additional information about applicants seeking admission, prepares students with 21st century skills, highlights the value of foreign and native language instruction in schools, and affirms the value of diversity in a multilingual society; and

WHEREAS, the world language classroom is where language and culture intersect, and students gain new levels of appreciation and an enhanced perspective of our diverse global society; New York State recognizes the value and importance of linguistic studies, and commends teachers and students who bridge cultural boundaries by learning to speak, understand, read, and write in other languages;

Now, Therefore, I, Andrew M. Cuomo, Governor of the State of New York, do hereby proclaim March 6-12, 2017 as

FOREIGN LANGUAGE WEEK

in the Empire State.

Chapter Reports

Eta Pi:

The 2016-2017 academic year has been an exciting and eventful one for the ETA PI chapter at Fairfield University in Fairfield, CT. Our chapter participated in the Open Houses for accepted students as well as the Activities Fairs in both semesters. In October, our officers hosted an event for our members, and invited the international students on campus to craft canvas bags for Halloween. This was a great way to meet the International students, learn something about their culture, and make them feel welcome.

In December, just before finals, our members decorated Christmas ornaments and sang carols in various languages.

In March, our chapter participated in Foreign Language Week by hosting activities, supplying refreshments, and getting the major language clubs to participate. During the same week, AMG Officers helped with a Foreign Film Festival, which was hosted by the Department of Modern

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Languages and Literatures. Our initiation, which was one of the largest thus far, with over 200 people in attendance, also took place in March. We inducted approximately 100 students studying close to ten languages in our Department. Among them were the seniors who received their honor cords. During the ceremony, we announced the new Officers, who will begin their duties this coming fall semester. We also inducted two faculty members, one from the School of Nursing and the other from the Department of Modern Languages and Literatures. The new Administrative Assistant of AMG Headquarters at Fairfield University, Mrs. Leslie Brazier, was also initiated as an honorary member. Two of our students have won AMG Scholarships. Shannon Carney won the James Fonseca \$500 Scholarship and Sean Tomlinson won the Sister Eloise-Thérèse \$500 Scholarship.

Lota Lambda:

The **Lota Lambda** chapter at Mississippi College became active for 2016-2017 after five years. The chapter inducted 23 students in the fall across 4 languages. The induction ceremony featured guest speaker, Dr. Elise Monroe Gagne, who is a professor of linguistics and MS humanities Council Teacher of the year. During the spring semester, the chapter elected officers and held bi-weekly meetings. The chapter also hosted world renowned poet, Jacobo Llano of Spain. Jacobo Llano held poetry understanding sessions in both English and Spanish, open to the entire campus. Two foreign language weeks were hosted specifically for French and Spanish, during the months of March and April. These language emphasis weeks included International movie nights, cooking classes for traditional dishes, informational tables and conversation in the cafeteria, and French desserts for lunch, among other activities.

On April 12, 2017, the **Nu Iota** chapter at the University of South Carolina Upstate welcomed 10 new student members and one honorary member. For the first time in our history, we inducted a student of American Sign Language, Austin D. Lindsey. Our guest speaker was Dr. Alexander Akulli, Director of the Center for International Studies, whose spoke about “Alternative Realities and the Pursuit of Happiness in an Interdependent Global Society. As an Albanian, he helped us appreciate what true happiness is, that it is not rooted in material wealth, rather spiritual and ethical values. He suggested that while many are trying to make America “great again”, it would be beneficial to make American shappy again. He provided data on how the level of “happiness” in the United States has decreased tremendously since he and his family arrived in this country some years ago.

Several members graduated with honors and received awards. Rachel Baylor, Secretary 1916 – 1917 received the Outstanding Spanish Major Award and Amy Richards, Spanish Education major, received the Outstanding Spanish Non-Major Award at the annual College of Arts and Sciences’ Scholars Day Ceremony. Nia Payne and Rachel Baylor graduated Magna Cum Laude, as well.

Community service hours increased this year, as all Board Members participated in community engagement this year: Glorymar Pi, Stefany Porras, and Rachel Baylor.
